NATURAL BRIDGE (HOWRAH BRIDGE)



The Natural Bridge (also known locally as Howrah Bridge) is a stunning natural rock and coral formation located on Neil Island (Shaheed Dweep) in the Andaman and Nicobar Islands. It is one of the island's most photographed and geologically significant landmarks — a perfect example of the power of erosion and marine processes over thousands of years.
